WOLVES We will be running the usual places keeping the wolf numbers down but will be going into one area on the Hyland and another on the upper Coal that has not been hunted or trapped. Call for time and dates if you want to come with us.

GRIZZLY Grizzly numbers are up, quite possibly as a result of our wolf management so we are selling a couple spring bear hunts. Joel and myself will be the guides. We will be using boats, Argos and the Hovercraft so will be able to access a lot of prime bear country. Horseback hunts after August 20th are best for fall bear.

MOOSE The numbers are way up but we are full for 2012. We do have a few openings for 2013.

CARIBOU Numbers are stable to increasing except possibly the Finlayson herd which we can't access the winter range to manage the wolves. Still have openings Aug 26 to Sept 4 and Sept 6 to 13.

GOAT I only took one goat hunter last year so we have lots of billies around. We will be hunting the upper Coal this year which holds the majority of our goats. Have openings starting Aug 11 and 26.

SHEEP Similar to the goat outlook with only the Aug 11 to 22 back pack or 24 horse hunt are still open.

Come Hunt Canada's Yukon With Us

What a fall! We broke records for the amount of rain and water levels in August. We couldn't even get into Sheep Camp the normal way as the rivers were so high. Once we got there the weather remained wet. This continued well into September so the moose didn't have to go to the water for the rut as the water came to them. The horse hunts were okay as one can glass and ride back to the moose. Enough complaining, life is good and a hard year makes one appreciate the good years more. What was consistent was the effort by the guides and staff. They always go above and beyond expectations. Thanks crew!!!!

In November, Ruth and I had the privilege of trapping her line again. We caught 40 martin, a couple wolverine, wolf and weasels. The country is so gorgeous that I had to stop and just admire the scenery. Thank you Lord for making this for me. Ruth's average of \$103.00 per martin is the best I've heard of though Joel did beat her top price by one cent.

We did the Dallas Safari show in early January with okay results and headed for South Padre Island for some R&R when Ruth gets a call from Chelsea and Glenn. We are grandparents of Porter. I pretty much had to tie Ruth down to keep her there. See the pictures. He is the cutest!!!!!!!!!!!!

We had two hunters accompany us as we trapped wolves in February. Joel and Bill Daniels took a couple nice wolves which pretty much wiped out the Rock River pack while Steve Trien picked up 2 of the last 4 from the Bobs Canyon Pack.

March is a great month to enjoy the Yukon and we were out on our snowmobiles doing just that. We fixed up cabins upstream from the Coal Forks and south of Hyland Lake. Both of these have great moose potential. Unfortunately the one on the Coal was attacked by a grizzly so we will have to get in this spring and try stop him. You want to come and try? We also fixed up Hyland Lake and cut wood for the Yusezyu.

In April we planned to go up to Ted's camp on the lower Hyland but ran out of time and snow. Ruth and I headed down to visit Glenn, Chelsea and Porter. I left Ruth there and went down to Seattle and picked up a Hovercraft. It has been a learning experience but I have been able to do it. It is amazing the water I can go through. Instead of dodging rocks and gravel bars one can go right over them.

Colton Wayne, a recruit from the Dallas Safari Club was our youth hunter. He had to be back in Dallas for hockey school, yes, I said hockey school, Aug 10th. We moved to North Camp expecting to see a few goats right above camp but no such luck. The first day we went up the creek and saw a small goat and a couple good moose. Next day we went south but only saw a small bull moose so I decided to go up over a pass nobody had been over since the early 90s. I said we should be there in about 3 hours. The time was right but the camp just didn't enough horse feed so I decided to go to another area. We had cut the trail 20 years earlier but it had overgrown and what should have been a couple hours took us four of rough brush busting to get to the flat and then another

hour at least to find a camp. Needless to say Colton put in the miles that day. We got camp set up and supper on just as it was getting dark. The good news is that we spotted goats right from camp. Next morning we ride up and take a billy. Colton's sister Rachel had hunted with us in 09 and taken a goat. Hers was a first day kill and Colton's a last day.

The weather turned real bad when Colton and Mark left. We got at least 2 feet of snow above 5,000 feet, of course this was rain in the lower country. Donn and Deiter Pfannenstien went into Dendale after sheep while Fabian and I took Keno Zeidlewitz and repeat hunter C.J. Winand into Sheep camp. The rivers were too high to get in the normal way as we would have had to swim the lower parts of Sheep Creek and that is just too dangerous. We had to wait a day for luggage and then lost another day by going in the long way. The water had come down enough that we could get to camp without swimming even though some of the pack horses did.

Fabian and Keno were looking for sheep but could not find them. All the hot spots were just barren. The snow had driven them out of the high country and we just plain couldn't find them. C.J. and I were able to capture a great caribou stalk and bow kill on camera. It basically rained the whole hunt, not hard enough to cause flooding but enough to keep the rivers high so we had to go out the long way. Donn and Deiter had the same lack of luck.

Steve Keithley and Don Stout had a caribou bow hunt booked for the 26th of August which is prime time. Dave, Donn and Fabian are waiting at Hyland for them but we hear about a grizzly that had killed a caribou and is sitting on it. Steve wants a grizzly with his bow so Dave and him fly in. The bear is gone but Steve gets a shot at a wolf which is even more difficult with a bow. They spend a day looking but just can't come up with it so fly back to Hyland and continue the hunt. In spite of seeing many good bulls they move to Greyling Lake with great anticipation but were disappointed as the caribou just weren't there.

Joel and Steve Ward hunted by Argo at this time. They saw lots of caribou and take a nice one.

Win Scott and Terry Burgess were next. They fly into Greyling Lake and move to Caribou Flats. The caribou just aren't there, normal is 20 to 50 a day, they see 3 but Terry does get a couple wolves. He is from Australia and was using my 300 Browning. Unfortunately I had not sent in the clip so it was a single shot. Win decided to call it quits so I sent a plane in with the clip and to bring him out.

Dr Duke Lovetter comes in and helps move to Hyland Lake where he and Terry both take moose.

Joel takes Al Holland, James gets Eldon Lonburg and Dave has Cody Robbins on the first moose hunt of the year. Joel tries to get into a hot spot with the Argo but the water is too high so comes back and hunts by boat. He goes to the Coal Forks cabin only to discover that a grizzly has destroyed it. They hunt hard but just can't find a big enough bull. James starts out at Ted's old camp on the Hyland but only see small bulls so we switch to the Coal where they take a meat bull on the last day. Dave and Cody of "Live2hunt" hunt Toobally. It was slow but they get a nice bull. This is all captured on film including a big bull that shows up in camp the last day and will be aired next year.

Robbie draws our second Australian hunter of the year Matt Warner. Matt's wife Barb who came for the vacation was a welcome person in camp in spite of being scared to go out at night because of the grizzly. A black bear and moose fall to Matt's shooting. Robbie's next hunter James Dixon takes possibly the best scoring moose of the season. This is James' second trip and both his bulls are huge.

Next up is Jimmy Keyes and Randy Hancock, both repeat hunters from last year. Joel and Jimmy head to South camp. About an hour out they spot a grizzly and shoot. The bear disappears, reappearing 20 feet away in full charge, dropping a few feet from them. While skinning the bear, they hear shots so know that Randy has a moose. Next day they go for a short ride and take the biggest moose of the year. Fabian and Randy decide to take the big caribou that they have seen off and on for the last month.

Josh and Heather Slager of "Slager Outdoors" return for another hunt. On their first day out they are calling for moose but get a grizzly. Donn has to shoot in front of the bear to stop it. They do get a nice moose later in the hunt. Dave and Danny Deaver hunt Toobally successfully for a moose while James and Sue Johnson are also successful on the Coal. Sue's moose has a short third horn growing in the center of its head. While Dave is cruising in to check Cody's gut pile another grizzly chases them off. This is the third aggressive bear of the season.

Bradley Mongold arrives a couple days early so comes with me to pick up the horses. On the way home we drop him and Fabian off on the Hyland River. Fabian has never been on the river before so we give him a tent and foamies in case they don't make the camp they have never been to. They are cruising down when they spot a grizzly.

They drift in and Brad, who is a bow hunter takes a shot. The bear charges but another shot turns him and he runs back and piles up. It is a huge B&C grizzly on its last legs as it has no teeth or fat. They set up camp under a tree and call in. When I get home with the horses I get the news that they already have a bear. A couple days later Fabian also gets him a moose.

Robbie takes Gary Curtin on the last hunt successfully getting him a nice bull while Fabian puts Gary's son in law Philip Hedgerough on another nice one. Don Stout and Mike Kaczor hunt Toobally with Dave and James. A bull has been hanging around and shows up just as the 6 hour wait is done. Mike's arrow does the trick though they have to wait till morning to find the bull. Don and James see and stalk several but don't finalize the deal. Donn and Stefano Stanghellini took a big bull from Joel's trapline.

Joel and I hunt the Coal with Paul and Alexandre. We see a lot of moose and late on the third day Alexandre takes a couple shots at a big bull. It is late and they can't track it so return at first light. While motoring down a pack of wolves runs out on a gravel bank. Unfortunately they were in rough water so the shooting wasn't the best but one did drop. They load it and continue down. It had snowed a bit but there was enough blood so they could track it. After a couple beds the blood stopped and they were unable to find it. Paul and I stopped in after lunch and went on down to the Rock. On the way home we spot the bull we want. A couple shots later and we have him down. A nice 195 class bull. I am able to pull the cape off and dress it and take off just as the sun is setting. It is only 1 1/2 hours to camp but we make it. The hour after dark travel was very hard on my nerves but we never even touched a rock.

The last moose hunter of the year was Pat and Nicole of "Driven TV". Joel was the guide. The moose numbers were incredible. Best day was 26 moose of which 10 were bulls. They saw well over 100 moose in 10 days. On the way back to Watson they also take a real nice black bear.

On October 13 Ruth gets a call informing us that Porter Martin is officially Glenn and Chelsea's. The paperwork had finally come through. Meanwhile, Glenn accepted a job with Edmonton Firefighters and they had purchased a new home on Half Moon Lake just outside of Sherwood Park. Lots of events happening in this little guy's life since his arrival - born in a blizzard, his file surviving the fire that burned the government office and 1/3 the town, flooding a month later, Glenn's career change, parents' moving, and finally at 10 months old, OURS!!!

Joel's friend and mule deer outfitter, Tanner Walgenback brought his dad up for a caribou. They hunt one day and put a 394 (444 SCI) class bull on the table. They blew a couple chain tensioners on the Argo so had to all three ride the Honda next day for Tanner's 380 bull. On the way home they spot a huge bull so send Donn and George Gonsales after it. It turns out to be a 390 (464 SCI) point beauty. The last hunter was Perry Hisaw and I get to be the guide. The caribou are leaving but we found a heavy 365 point bull and end the season.
